Lasting Impacts: Hailey's Story



Our daughter, Hailey, was born seven weeks premature and weighed only 2 pounds 11 oz. My husband could literally hold her tiny body in the palm of his hand. Because of Hailey's prematurity, she had to spend five weeks in the NICU (Neonatal Intensive Care Unit). It was so difficult to give birth and leave the hospital without our precious little baby girl. Days and nights were spent visiting Hailey, just to lay my hand upon her when she was too sick and tiny to hold. The NICU physicians found a heart defect and said Hailey would need heart surgery when her weight reached 10 pounds. At 6 months old, Hailey was able to have heart surgery and spent another five weeks in the hospital. During this procedure doctors discovered that Hailey's vocal cords were paralyzed. She could not breathe or eat on her own requiring intubation and a gastrostomy tube for survival.

We knew at a very young age that our sweet little redheaded baby girl would need extra help. Hailey was referred to the Achievement Academy's Birth to Three program. An early interventionist came to our home to provide early intervention services when she was a year old. Hailey could not hold her head up or make eye contact. Because she needed ongoing intensive services, she was soon referred to the Achievement Academy's Charter School program when she was 18 months old. We knew it was going to be hard to trust anyone with our medically fragile little girl — until my husband and I walked through the doors of the school. There were bright friendly colors, happy smiling children and a loving staff. We immediately felt at home and knew Hailey would benefit from going to school there.

When Hailey started going to school at Achievement Academy she was 18 months old and could not even sit up on her own. She began receiving individual physical, occupational and speech therapy. Progress was very slow but we had HOPE . . . HOPE for Hailey that she would continue to reach her developmental milestones. Hailey also has a hearing loss in her left ear and wears glasses to help her vision. Hailey's teachers, classroom staff and therapists at Achievement Academy were so patient and worked diligently with her on her goals in such a collaborative environment. She started to master some basic skills but was still very behind developmentally.

The gains Hailey continued to make in the years she attended Achievement Academy were astonishing. She finally began to walk at almost four years old. We were thrilled to watch her blossom. Hailey went from a little girl who some said would never walk and talk to a beautiful little girl ready to graduate Achievement Academy at 6 years old and enter a typical Kindergarten program.

Today Hailey is in 4th grade and loves school. She is caring and compassionate with her classmates and loves to help everyone. She helps me make Blessing Bags at the holidays to give to the less fortunate. Hailey wants to be a doctor when she grows up to help eliminate cancer. Pilot Program Update ~ Integrated Listening System

Last year we began a new program that is benefitting students who need help with sensory integration. The Integrated Listening System (iLs) is a multi-sensory exercise program for improving brain and body function. The activities are fun and

can be customized for all ages and skill levels. The iLs program is unique in providing input to multiple senses at the same time through music, movement and language, which is delivered via specialized headphones combined with body movement and speech tasks.

Our pilot program is in full swing. Students use the system for 60 minutes, three times a week, during classroom and therapy time. Based on therapist and teacher input, what we have seen so far with some of the students include: decrease in anxiety, increase in attention and focus, and improved social engagement.
