Lasting Impressions: Allesandro's Story

Allesandro is what many would describe as a typical teenager, who enjoys all things related to science, video games, and chess. He is a bright student who graduated with honors from Lakeland Senior High School before continuing his studies at the Rochester Institute of Technology (RIT), where he recently returned for the start of his sophomore

However, 20 years ago, his parents feared this future for Allesandro may never be possible. In November 2001, Allesandro entered the world at just 35 weeks and was diagnosed with a Grade III Intraventricular Hemorrhage (IVH). He was airlifted from Bartow Regional Medical Center to Lakeland Regional Health, where he spent several weeks in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit. Infants who develop a hemorrhage in the brain at birth have a greatly increased chance that their development skills will be compromised. Those weeks were a frightening time for parents, Coleen and Guy, as they watched their baby fight.

Doctors advised Allesandro's parents that he would suffer from cerebral palsy and may never gain the ability to



walk, feed himself, or complete other basic functions. For first-time parents, this kind of news was devastating as they reframed their expectations and dreams for their child. Fortunately, Allesandro was referred to our Birth to Three program when he was just a few months old, which changed the course of his development.



Becky Jacklin, an Early Interventionist with our Birth to Three program, began working with Allesandro and his parents to provide in-home early intervention services designed to help him gain the skills needed to reach his developmental milestones. Because of the damage the hemorrhage caused to his brain, Allesandro needed help learning what often comes naturally to other children. Becky worked with him through tummy time, helped him learn to roll over and sit up, and practiced bringing his hands to mid-line.

Another effect of the damage was Allesandro's brain had "forgotten" he had a left side, so he had to retrain his brain to use that side of his body. Becky advised Coleen to use large or oversized toys when playing with her

baby, which would require him to use two hands to pick up and carry. This helped him remember to use his left side. In addition to gaining physical skills, Allesandro had a profound hearing loss that he had to learn to accommodate while making strides in his developmental goals.

The impact of these early intervention services helped change the trajectory of Allesandro's early childhood and prepared him for success as he continued his journey through Pre-Kindergarten, his primary education, and off to college at RIT, where he earned a place on the Dean's List his first year. The academic success he has achieved is leaps and bounds from what his earliest physicians predicted would be possible.

Today, Coleen shares how thankful she is to Becky and the services she provided to Allesandro, helping lay his foundation for learning. "We have always said that 'it takes a village', and we are grateful that Achievement Academy has been a part of our village!"

Tools For Success

Equipment that enables a child to feel a sense of independence is vital to their development. For example,



being able to play with their classmates and eat lunch around a table allows children to see the world from a new perspective. We are fortunate to have a variety of therapy equipment at each campus to give our students the essential help they need to master daily

A great example of our therapy equipment is Firefly's GoTo Seat, an important device used to assist children who need additional support to sit upright on their own. The GoTo Seat gives the child additional independence, and is used in therapy and in the classroom to provide children with postural support and

head control. The GoTo Seat can be placed in the bumper car in our physical therapy room to assist a child with mobility, or attached to the swing as they work with their therapist to master motor skills.

This specialized equipment helps our students develop independence, confidence, and master skills to achieve
